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Violinist Jaime Jorge Brings Music to India

It was a hot, sticky day at the Asian Aid Blind School and the humid air was alive with the sound of children's chattering voices as they excitedly filed into the patio holding the metal railing that ran the length of the courtyard. Some were partially blind and others fully blind since childhood, but they held hands leading and following each other with grins of anticipation as they sat down cross-legged on the concrete floor.

Jaime Jorge, renowned violinist, sat on a plastic lawn chair gazing at the 100 children seated on the ground in front of him. Some of them had never had the joy of seeing the faces of their friends sitting next to them or even knew the color of their uniforms, but they sat with smiles and their heads upturned eagerly awaiting whatever they would hear next. Jaime tightened his

bow, adjusted his violin under his chin, and slowly drew his bow across the strings, filling the courtyard with the beautiful melody of "What a Friend We Have in Jesus". As he played with his eyes tightly shut, imagining how it would sound to a blind child, he suddenly heard little voices joining in. Soon, the whole courtyard of children had united in singing the familiar melody and swelled the song of the violin into a resonating children's choir. The sound spoke of lives broken with the challenges of life, poverty, and blindness, but alive with the hope of opportunity and the simple joy of knowing that they too had a wonderful Friend in Jesus. It was a moment that brought tears to Jaime's eyes and left a special memory in the hearts and ears of the children that day.

During his time in India, Jaime also visited the Vizak Slum School and Vizianagaram boys' dorm building project. At the Sunrise Orphanage he played a concert for over 800 local villagers and attended the opening of the new Sunrise boys' dorm. This new dorm will house another 58 children, has the option for a second floor, and contains a dean's apartment, two toilet/shower facilities, a clothes washing area, and a worship hall.

Ibrahimpatnam Upgrades

Ibrahimpatnam SDA School is located near the city of Vijayawada in the state of Andhra Pradesh, India. It offers grades K-12 and has over 700 children, of which Asian Aid currently sponsors 266. This school has extremely high potential as it serves a poor area of India but also is located in an area to attract fee paying students. To ensure that the school is able to grow and meet new government standards, the Asian Aid Education Development Fund has implemented a development project which covers sewer improvement, toilet and shower renovation, boys' dormitory refurbishment, building of a security wall, and providing new classroom resources (such as library books, computers, and science lab equipment). Once these have been completed, extension and redevelopment of the girl's dormitory will begin as the current rooms are overcrowded and susceptible to mold. Vizianagaram Dormitory

On his recent visit to India, Asian Aid USA CEO Jim Rennie was able to visit the Vizianagaram boys' dormitory project and was pleased to see that the roof is now complete. This new building will house an additional 36 children (with room for expansion to a second floor) and includes a dean's apartment, cafeteria, and worship hall. It will be a great blessing for this small, extremely needy school in the poor district of Vizianagaram.

Asian Aid USA Project Team

To manage and direct its projects in India, Asian Aid USA established a project team which is based in Visakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh. The team is led by a USA father and son team, Wally and John Marienau. John is also accompanied by his wife, Malu, who assists with accounting and project support. Asian Aid has a number of Indian staff who are extremely valuable, especially as one of Wally and John's objectives is to train local staff to run development projects. Asian Aid is very grateful for the dedication of this team amid the many challenges they face. We also are thankful for their families who support them and Asian Aid during their long periods away from home.

Education Development: Repair and expansion of the girl's dormitory at Ibrahimpatnam School. Other requests for school resources including science equipment and library books.

Lakpahana Adventist School Making a Difference in Sri Lanka

Asian Aid is currently supporting the development of Lakpahana Adventist College in Sri Lanka. With a current enrollment of 350 students, Lakpahana serves a cross section of the islands' population. Students are enrolled in classes in three languages - Sinhala, Tamil, and English - and students can receive training in Special English, Seminary, and Teacher Training classes. In addition to the normal elementary and secondary classes, Lakpahana has a growing college and industrial education program.

All students are required to participate in a work program where they work 1½ hours on weekdays and four hours on Sunday. In addition to the "normal"






work areas at a boarding school (such as janitorial, cafeteria, and grounds), students work in the campus dairy, poultry, agriculture, coconut trees, and bakery industries. By the end of the year the school plans to reopen the cereal puffing and peanut butter industries. All of these industries provide products for the cafeteria but are also designed to provide additional operating income for the school.

Thank you to the many individuals who have given towards this school and are helping provide a Christ centered education in the country of Sri Lanka.

Bordered by Thailand, China, and India, Myanmar is a very poor country that has suffered much political unrest and religious suppression. Public evangelism is not allowed outside the church buildings and schools, so Adventist education will play an important role in the future of the Myanmar Adventist Church.

Arriving in the rainy season made travel difficult due to widespread flooding, but Mr. Rennie was able to visit Mountain View Academy, Eric B. Hare School, West Yangoon Adventist Seminary, and a village school where he was impressed with the

Surgeries Give Hope to Children in Nepal

Earlier this year, Asian Aid received an urgent request from Scheer Memorial Adventist Hospital in Nepal to help fund 100 children's hydrocele operations. Male hydrocele is a condition that occurs prenatally where fluid collects in the scrotal area causing pain and leading to hernias. In some cases, the hydrocele will resolve itself while the child is still young, but if not, Scheer Hospital has stepped in to provide hernia repairs for the children and prevent further complications.

The 100 surgeries funded by Asian Aid will assist children whose families are unable to afford the surgery and would otherwise be put on long waiting lists at government hospitals where they could wait up to a year. Thank you to those who have given towards the Nepal Health Fund and improved the lives of these 100 needy children.
