# Early December, Jim Rennie, CEO, got on a plane for 30 hours of flying from the US to Bangladesh for the first time.

Bangladesh is located on the east border of India and the west border of Myanmar. This beautiful country has a population of over 156 million people and over 29,000 members of the Adventist church. During the first weekend of the visit, he joined in the 100th year celebration of the Adventist church in Bangladesh.

For this exciting event, General Conference President was in attendance with his wife Nancy. Pastor Wilson was proud of the key

role Asian Aid has taken in sponsoring children while simultaneously supporting Adventist mission schools. After the ceremonies, Jim flew an hour north to visit the Seventh-day Adventist

the Seventh-day Adventist Maranatha Seminary (SAMS) campus. SAMS is located on the northern end of the Bangladesh-India border. In that area, security is tight and all foreign visitors are required to have a police escort. For Jim it was very different to have four heavily armed policemen as his escorts.

SAMS was built by Garwin McNeilus, an American businessman, in 1993 and has become a huge means of outreach in the area. With over 800 students and about 50 sponsored children, SAMS has a lot of property that includes some vegetable gardens that provides fresh produce for them. The principal, Benjamin Mrong, gave Jim a tour of the campus and pointed out the shortage of computer

For Jim it was very different to have four heavily armed policemen as his escorts. resources. Recognizing the importance of this need, Jim made arrangements for the school to purchase 20 new computers and two new printers. What a blessing!

God is doing a lot through the staff at the Adventist mission schools in Bangladesh to revive hope in their hearts and inspire their minds. Jim looks forward to his next trip back to Bangladesh this year.

# **Success Story: Milton Das**

Milton Das is the Director of Bangladesh Children's Sponsorship Services (BCSS), a partner organization of Asian Aid. He enjoys the smiles and happiness of children and voung people after giving hope with assurance of sponsorship for their education. "I enjoy seeing that the students are graduating, being self-reliant and also helping others," he says. "Further, I am very happy to have very dedicated team." Before his fourth birthday, Milton lost his father to liver cancer and as a result, his education was put in jeopardy. With his then pregnant mother unable to carry the burden of caring for Milton and his younger brother, he wondered, how would I be able to start school? Who would support my education? Thousands of miles away, Joy Butlin, a typing

teacher, attended a meeting at her job. That

day an appeal was made for the staff to join the Asian Aid family and sponsor a child. "I chose Milton that day," says Joy. Milton was now a part of the Asian Aid family with a sponsor and a chance for a better future. Over the next 20 years, Joy continued to support Milton until he completed his bachelor's degree in education at Bangladesh Adventist Seminary and College. Joy was proud of the man who Milton had become. "It is a delight to me that Milton has been able to care for his widowed mother and be a tower of strength for his family, church, and country," she says. Now, Milton continues to live out his passion of being an "agent for changing lives for this world and the world to come." He believes he is the fruit of the seeds that were planted so many years ago. "Today," he says, "Asian



Aid is continuing to plant the same seeds of love and care for other children and young people through education; seeds that will bear fruit tomorrow."

While Milton has a story that is his own, there are many more children who have overcome tough obstacles in their lives to get an education. Asian Aid is a part of many past stories, many current stories, and with your help, many more to come.



# Sponsorship Gift Program All children love to get presents!

Asian Aid understands how rewarding it can be to send your sponsored child a special gift; however, the process and cost has been prohibitive and confusing for many years.

Both you and Asian Aid have encountered:

- High cost of postage.
- Gifts not reaching our office in country.
- Gifts missing during the country delivery.
- Student owing duty on a package that they can't afford to pay.
- Packages arriving opened with missing items.

We have set up a gift program in India to alleviate the stress of sending gifts overseas. As we figure out how to overcome the issues in the other countries, we will open up the program in those countries as well.

If you are a sponsor of a child in India, you will be able to select a gift and purchase it through the Asian Aid USA office. Gift options will be sent to all sponsors of Indian children

based on age and gender. As you select your gift, we encourage you to write a letter to accompany your gift. You can then place your order, send your letter and payment to our office or give us a call to make your payment. All orders and letters must be received by the deadline. We will send the order to our partner office in India, they will fulfill the order and then deliver it to your sponsored child.

## The two deadlines each year will be:

### **May 31**

Deadline for order and payment to be received by the Asian Aid office

#### August

When your gift and letter will be delivered to your sponsored child

### October 31

Deadline for order and payment to be received by the Asian Aid office

#### **February**

When your gift and letter will be delivered to your sponsored child
