Dear Friends,

2020 has been an immense challenge and continues to be so. The situation is impossible to predict and we are seeing extreme poverty as people in the countries we serve have no work and no government assistance. Near our orphanage in India, villagers came begging because they had no food for the next day. They were grateful for our help. At the time of writing this letter, schools in those countries are still closed, and, being in mainly poorer communities, online classes are not possible.

Currently, our process is to do all we can to contact the children and then either send them half of the sponsorship funds to help the family or send them food directly. We believe that this huge logistical exercise is already in place for over

60 percent of the children impacted.

Some have asked why schools are being paid during lockdown without students. That is a fair question. It is critical to keep the school running, so that when it

reopens, essential supplies and the necessary staff will be there for the students. This task has been challenging to continue and may result in the closure of some schools. We are playing a key role in keeping many Adventist mission schools open.

This situation has affected all of the countries we serve and is the largest crisis we have ever had to face. Any support for our "Rice Appeal" or our "Where Needed Most Fund" will still impact those who are struggling.

Please pray for our program. As I see the funds arriving, it is very humbling, and I am most grateful for the Lord's blessing and the amazing support you have given us.

Trafficked Children Rescued from Forced Labor

Four children, ages six to seventeen, along with six adults were rescued by government agency officers and staff from a bag manufacturing facility located in Mukthi Karnataka, India in February 2020.

After their rescue, the children were taken to the local police station to give their statements and file the necessary papers. Later they were admitted to the Government Boys Home in Bengaluru, Karnataka, India. A complete medical examination by the medical practitioner found that one of the boys was addicted to tobacco. The victims were given aftercare and assistance with rehabilitation.

With the exception of one victim working for the past four years, the others were recruited six months prior to their rescue. The five adults and the children were verbally guaranteed a monthly salary but this promise was never met. Money was desperately needed by each of the victim's families to pay for medical treatment, house repairs, and debts.

Though the children were informed that their salary was given directly to their family, they were unsure how it was delivered or of the amount their family members received. Since they were all supposedly given an advance, no salary was paid out to the individuals working. The children were trafficked and taken by the proprietor and another worker from Bihar to the facility where they were forced to work alongside adults in the same environment.

Their working hours were gruesome and exploitative, forced to work six days a week, some Sundays, and nearly eleven hours a day in close quarters where the conditions were deplorable and extremely unsanitary. The same facility was used for manufacturing, sleeping, food preparation and cooking. The quality of rations was so poor that on the day of the rescue there was a sack of rotten potatoes and spoiled vegetables.

Government Tax Announcements

These are extremely difficult times for everyone, and we wish to share with you the latest developments in giving options. The recent Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act of March 27, 2020 offers some great opportunities for supporting Child Impact International.

Here is an outline of those options made available for Tax Year 2020 only:

- You may be able to deduct up to 100% of your adjusted gross income on gifts made to Child Impact or other charities.
 Deductible amounts are normally limited to 60% of Adjusted Gross Income (AGI).
- Even non-itemizing individuals are eligible for a \$300 charitable deduction (\$600 for couples) for gifts made to Child Impact. This deduction reduces taxable income thus reducing taxes paid.
- Qualified Charitable Rollover (QCR) remains unchanged.
 Required Minimum Distributions (RMD) are waived for most qualified plan participants for Tax Year 2020. Even without a required minimum distribution, qualified charitable distributions offer tax savings for most.

This will enable Child Impact to understand the needs of the hospital and Jim's strong administrative experience will be a beneficial addition to the board. Child Impact hopes to announce a new Nepal initiative in the early part of 2021.
