Trina Gifford has been sponsoring Deepthi for the last four years. Never in her wildest dreams did Trina think her commitment to sponsor Deepthi's education would take her on a 10,000 mile journey to Andhra Pradesh, India.

Deepthi is now a 5th grade student at the Vizianagaram School, which has suffered with very old, run-down, and leaking classrooms. However, you may have seen in our last newsletter that Asian Aid USA would be building Vizianagaram ten new classrooms. We are thrilled that construction will likely start within four weeks and soon Deepthi will be able to study in an environment more conducive to learning.

It is a very rare but special event when a sponsored child gets to meet his or her sponsor. Deepthi had always wished that she would have an opportunity to meet her sponsor and now her wishes came true. Initially being surprised and shy at meeting Trina, Deepthi soon warmed up to her. It was a special moment for Trina as well. "I was able to hug her and smile at her and say, 'my beautiful Indian daughter' and tell her that I loved her." The yearning and hope that many sponsors have for their sponsored children Trina expressed for Deepthi. "I would love for her just to be able to dream, to be able to hope, to be able to think that she has options, that she can move from her village, that she can become a teacher or a nurse. And just to give her that opportunity of choice, of freedom to travel to other places, to see other things, to grow her understanding of the world and have hopes for her future."

Harvest Time at Sunrise

The children at Sunrise Home are settling in to their new home, although it still seems a bit like heaven to them. If you have been following Asian Aid's Facebook page, you will know that recent news on campus has involved such excitement as snakes, pillows, and high-jump.

This last growing season, the children and staff enjoyed their first harvest from their farm. They pulled up Indian radishes, threshed rice, shucked corn, and harvested many other garden vegetables which added variety and homegrown flavors to the Sunrise kitchen. In a few months, a professional farmer from the US will be visiting Sunrise to help them develop and advance their agriculture program.

Sponsorship: The Challenges

Throughout the year we have the difficult job of telling some sponsors that their child has left the school. Although we offer them another child to sponsor in his/her place, it can be disappointing after the investment of emotions and finances.

In working with more than 130 schools, there are many factors which lead to these situations. Perhaps the most common is when parents move. In most cases the child does not show up at school and both the school and Asian Aid do not know where the child has gone. The parents of poorer children often do not want to face talking to the school and prefer to just disappear. In a small number of cases the child may leave the school because of pressure from friends or family members to not attend a Christian school. When our field officers visit a school they do their best to follow up with the child who has left. But in a country where there are often no phones or unclear addresses, this can be very difficult. This process can take time and often it may be eight weeks before the school can report to us that the child is definitely not returning. We understand the disappointment that sponsors feel but

hope that you realize that you have planted a seed in a child's heart and given them hope.

Most sponsors also look forward to their children's Christmas cards and letters, particularly in response to packages that may have been sent to their children. However, this can be another challenge as teachers in these schools are very busy and we are

dependent on them to ensure that the children write these. If you have a question regarding correspondence with your child, please contact us and we will do our best to look into it.

Many of you have mailed gifts or letters and wondered if your child received them. There have been problems within the India postal service and unfortunately some go missing. We are working on an online gift ordering system where the gifts can be distributed directly from our India office. This would save shipping time and expense. We will keep you informed as to when this is put into place. In the meantime, thank you so much for your understanding and patience.





Excitement for All the Senses

The high-pitched whirring of propellers on an airplane, the thundering of waves crashing on a beach; all of these are sounds that the more than 80 children at Asian Aid's School for the Hearing Impaired cannot or can only distantly hear. And yet the dimensions of life are still vibrant and alive for these children.



Recently the children had the excitement of taking a field trip to the coast of Karnataka and Goa. They had a full day visiting a science museum, planetarium, and aquarium where they saw brightly colored fish and handled prickly sea creatures. At the airplane museum, the boys enjoyed clamoring over and exploring the retired military planes. Most of the children had never experienced a beach, and although to many of them the crashing of the waves were silent, they were ecstatic to feel the warm gritty sand and smell and taste the spray of salt water on a boat ride. Joseph Bhaggien, principal

of the school, said, "I'm sure the experience will be cherished for a lifetime. Thank you for making this dream come true for our children!" More dreams were soon to come true.

In December 2012, generous Asian Aid USA and Australia donors helped fulfill another dream of the students who had a small amount of hearing capacity by supplying the school with over 80 high-quality, behind-the-ear hearing aids. Mr. Bhaggien recalled that "it was sheer joy to watch the smiling and excited faces of the children who were able to hear strange and new sounds for the first time!" He continued to explain that the staff were almost as excited as the students in their responsibility of teaching the children to "speak meaningful words and help in the care and maintenance of these aids". Perhaps another field trip is necessary, and this time when a wave crashes on the beach and a plane roars off the runway, excited children will be able to experience it to a fuller dimension and in a greater sense than ever before.

Vocational Training Acquisitions

Asian Aid has helped the Rajahmundry Adventist School in Andhra Pradesh India with equipment for the older boys in their vocational training. The new welding and electrical wiring machines will enable them to learn the skills of welding and rewiring motors and generators which are important for many

industries in India. David Keeler, Asian Aid's India Director, said "There is a large need in Adventist schools and colleges for trade and vocational training. Donations like this make a real difference in helping boys learn a trade."
