

Nepal: A Year Later the Need Continues



It has been a year since Nepal was devastated by two earthquakes. Together - Asian Aid with your help - provided over \$350,000 to support Scheer Memorial Adventist Hospital which provided emergency medical care free to the earthquake victims. Thank you for your support!

The effects of the two earthquakes in Kathmandu were felt as far as Mount Everest - 99.5 miles away. The death toll was over 8,600 and more than 21,000 individuals were injured. Although it's been a year, basic healthcare remains a major concern; many women do not have access to necessary health services.

This year the hospital will expand their services to include:

- Enhanced prenatal education, care, and screening for mothers
- Upgraded mother and baby labor and delivery services
- Lactation services
- Pelvic Organ Prolapse education, screening, and treatment
- Cervical cancer screening and treatment
- Breast cancer education, detection, and treatment

Since these services are so critical, equipment needed includes exam tables, birthing beds, ultrasound equipment - all of which total approximately \$56,000 we need to raise.

I know you care deeply about the people of Nepal and understand the importance of women's health. Please consider a gift of \$100, \$250, \$1,000, or whatever you can do to help.

Sponsorship in Adventist schools


Urgent need for Myanmar children and schools!!

As government schools became free, it became important to the Adventist church that our Myanmar Adventist schools also be free to poor parents. We welcomed over 600 children into the Asian Aid family who are able to learn more about Jesus in a country where evangelism is limited. We look forward to building the program in Myanmar as time goes on. With a new program come opportunities to develop new relationships and gain knowledge on their culture. In June CEO Jim Rennie will travel to set up the management process to help us attain our goal of 1,500 children in the program in two years. For our mission schools, the consistent resources will be a huge blessing. To most children coming from poor families, this is a great chance to attain a quality education.

AsianAID worldwide celebrates 50 years!



Asian Aid is proud to celebrate 50 years of giving hope! From our humble beginnings to impacting over 50,000 children, Asian Aid has grown to touch so many lives.

It all began in **1963** when founder Masie Fook saw an ad in a magazine to sponsor children in Asia. She wrote to an orphanage in Korea and began to sponsor two children. Three years later, Masie visited her two sponsored children and decided to adopt them. Upon her return to Australia, she convinced a group of friends to help her and her husband Denis to start her own organization. **With only \$2,000 and a ton of faith, Asian Aid was born.** The first sponsorships were in Vietnam with 750 children until the fall of Saigon in **1975**. So, in **1977** work began in India and **1987** work began in Bangladesh.

In **1981**, Helen Eager was appointed to the board after becoming very active in the organization as a volunteer. Over the next 30 years, Helen and others worked tirelessly in India and Bangladesh as well as Nepal and Sri Lanka. Working with donors around the world, like Garwin McNeilus from the US, schools, such as Immanuel School in Jeypore, India, were built and developed throughout India. Immanuel School is still one of Asian Aid's largest schools. Another one of our schools established was the School for the blind in Bobbili, India. In **1986**, Masie retired and Helen continued to nurture the work in the various countries. By **2000**, Asian Aid's donations totaled \$1.7 million with over 4,000 sponsored children. Sadly in **2002**, Masie passed away leaving a legacy of introducing thousands of children to Jesus.

Special thanks for Mrs. Helen Eager for her leadership and all the sacrifices that she has given to over 50,000 children.

Helen will be visiting the USA August 3 - 6 for ASI National.

In **2001**, Asian Aid USA was formed by a group of passionate volunteers that grew the organization to 600 children. In **2009**, Jim Rennie was appointed CEO and developed a growth strategy that included moving from Nebraska to Collegedale, TN and creating the **"Hope in Motion"** series. With **"Hope in Motion"** airing on 3ABN and travel around the country sharing the message of child sponsorship, donations in **2015** excelled to \$2.4 million with over 3,500 children. Combined Asian Aid Australia and Asian Aid USA have \$6.6 million in support and over 9,000 children sponsored in Adventist schools!

Child labor rescue

In February, OCR alongside India partner Freedom Project India carried out a child labor rescue raid in two locations in Bangalore India. Many children in India are forced into slave labor by working long hours seven days a week. After receiving a tip about child labor practices in the area, the team assembled with police officers and for two days had these businesses under surveillance.

The team and police then raided the locations. That day the children had been working since 6:00am and were prepared to work a 12 hour shift stitching bags. The raid was successful in rescuing 12 boys between the ages of 12 and 16. The boys were checked out by medical staff and then interviewed by the team. Altogether, three employees of the bag manufacturer were arrested.

Child labor continues to be an issue in many countries including India.

We are grateful to "Operation Child Rescue" supporters who help make it possible for us to end these heinous practices.




Kids Helping Kids

For most 11 year olds, birthdays mean cake, gifts, and lots of fun!

Instead, for Rebecca Mercado, it was an opportunity to raise money for Asian Aid. In December 2015 Rebecca, her mother Connie Mercado, and 19 others boarded a plane from LAX airport, in Los Angeles, to India. Rebecca was excited for her two week adventure!

Rebecca quickly came face-to-face with the unique beauty and culture of India. Arriving at Bobbili Blind School she was welcomed with rose petals and bouquets. At Sunrise, they greeted her with a large welcoming banner. She met so many new people, put on a Christmas program, and enjoyed playing on the same grounds as our Asian Aid children. All too quickly the trip came to a close.

Arriving back in the USA, India lingered in her thoughts. She recalled playing outside one day and falling. It hurt because of the tiny sharp rocks. Realizing that not every child at these two schools had flip flops, she wanted to do something about that. Why should they get hurt the way she had? When her birthday party came around, she asked friends and family to bring a donation for Asian Aid instead of a gift. Held at the beach with a flip flops theme, **Rebecca raised over \$400 and \$650 in total the weeks following her party. Now 12 years old, Rebecca can look back with pride on the impact she made in India - 280 little feet say thank you!**

Debbie's "children" pray for her EVERY day and ask that we pray for them and their families as well. They are very open writing about God to us. These letters make their

lives at school very real to us because we can "picture" their world. A world where their parents are proud their children are receiving the education they never attained—says one of the blind girls Debbie and her husband sponsor.

Finally, Debbie shares how easy it is to work with Asian Aid staff that are always very helpful, knowledgeable, and friendly if they have questions. She takes advantage of the hassle-free to automatic payments, updated pictures as their "children" mature.

"We have sponsored a child in another organization but had never received this much communication, updates, or pictures. We plan to continue our sponsorships for many years to come," said Debbie.
