CEO Report:

We are very grateful for the Lord's leading and for you.

In 2017, we met our budget requirements and continued to grow in donor numbers. This means, because of you and the Lord's blessings we are now assisting about 4,000 children throughout Bangladesh, India, Myanmar, Nepal and Sri Lanka.

We entered Myanmar (or Burma for those who have old maps and globes) in 2017. We established this sponsorship program with just over 600 children in 11 Adventist mission schools. There is a huge need in this country and we look forward to the growth of our program there.

Operation Child Rescue continues to grow with the rescue of children, many who are involved in sex trafficking. This program also rescues children from slums where orphans beg on the street to survive and abandoned babies die. Your support changes everything—we are very excited to assist the running costs of a rescue home for trafficked girls in Bangalore India impacting their lives at a critical stage after rescue. Orphans and abandoned babies receive love and have all their other needs secured. In the future, we intend to grow this brand into a wider Christian audience.

In India, we have established a strong office and management team to supervise our sponsorship program and project management. You might say, "They are our eyes, ears and hands in the field." They make sure our children are safe and secure.

We are a unique ministry in that we give most of our sponsorship to needy Adventist mission schools. Sponsorship of a child gives them an education in a mission school but also impacts their family, community and is valuable funding to the mission school.

I am very grateful for you and the work of my staff and board. I am also thankful for the field workers who implement our program.

I feel privileged to be your representative as I meet the children and see the work you allow us to perform. I assure you, you are making a difference in the lives of these special children. Without your support and God's blessings, we could do nothing.

Name change

In August 2017, Asian Aid USA will change its name to Child Impact International. It will be Asian Aid USA dba Child Impact International. The change does not impact this report period but noted as it will be public when this report is released.

Financial comments

Asian Aid USA retains up to 15% of all sponsorship and project donations towards the operational costs in the USA.

The "Where Needed Most" fund is an unrestricted fund for operating and project urgent needs where allocated.









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
