A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO

A girl who was "broken" and yet unbroken

I will never forget the first time I met Jotee.

I was in the Vizag slum in India, a place where prostitution is not just a risk but a predictable outcome. Jotee comes from the Dalit community, often referred to as the "lowest caste," a group whose very name means "broken" or "scattered." Yet when I met her, I didn't see someone broken. I saw determination.

Jotee was just 16 years old and had enrolled in Child Impact's tailoring course, which was developed to offer a way out of, or prevention for, prostitution. She spoke with excitement about what she was learning and, with remarkable initiative, asked if there was an opportunity to continue into an advanced course. At the time, there wasn't one. But because Jotee dared to ask, today every woman who enrolls in our tailoring program completes both a basic and advanced course. Her courage didn't just change her future; it changed the future for countless others.

When I returned to the Vizag slum a year later, I wondered where Jotee's journey had led. Our team visited her one-room home where she proudly showed me the sewing machine she had received upon completing the program. Jotee was creating a custom dress for a client, earning income, building dignity, and shaping her own future.

But she didn't stop there. Jotee is now pursuing a degree in social work. Her dream is to help others rise from the same difficult circumstances she was born into.

This is the difference you are making. Because of your generosity,

young women are gaining real alternatives, pathways that lead away from exploitation and toward independence and hope. In fact, women in the community have shared that since Child Impact began working in the Vizag slum six years ago, prostitution has dropped by 50%. Even one former brothel owner has left that life behind and is now enrolled in the tailoring course.

Your support is bringing light into places that once felt defined by darkness. And there are so many more girls like Jotee, full of potential, waiting for an opportunity.

As you read through this magazine and reflect on the impact you are making, I invite you to continue standing with us. Together, we can reach more young women, provide

more opportunities, and transform more lives. You can make a difference in the life of a young person like Jotee today.

INVISIBLE NO MORE

A journey of seeking, finding, and advocating

To be an advocate for the most vulnerable means you must find them first. At nine years old, Gun wasn't in a place where anyone would think to look.

Gun lives with five other children and four adults in a small home in Chiang Mai, Thailand. His family earns a living by selling flowers, mostly to tourists in nightclubs. Gun, like many other children, also sells flowers, often very late into the night. His job exposes him to drunk foreigners, prostitution, and drugs, all things no child should be surrounded by.

Gun eventually stopped going to school altogether and was involved in smoking, glue sniffing, cannabis use, and theft. His behavior often led to trouble with neighbors and police. His parents prioritize his ability to earn money over his education and prefer to keep him at home to help with flower selling.

Our team at Child Impact Thailand invited him to our after school program. As he began attending, the staff began to learn more of his story. Every time after the program would end, Gun met up with

the rest of his siblings to continue selling flowers, which sometimes lasted until two or three in the morning.

One day, Gun came running into our after school center followed by the police! He had stolen a moped, and the owner caught him on video. At only nine years old, Gun's life was headed down a very dark path. Our team offered to enroll him at a nearby boarding school, Chiang Mai Adventist Academy, where he would receive a proper education, structure, and support. Initially, his parents agreed, but

then became hesitant, thinking of the money they would lose without him selling flowers. Our team was finally able to convince his parents to give him a chance at a new beginning.

His start at the new school was hard. Gun struggled to adjust and even tried to run away several times. The routines and structure of school were overwhelming for a boy who had grown up without any boundaries. But the school staff didn't give up on him. They stayed patient, committed, and kept showing up for him through the difficult transition.

As time went on, Gun began to thrive. When our team visited him, he greeted them with a smile and was eager to share that he now has good friends who look out for him. He told them with pride, "My teachers really care about me."

They may seem like simple words, but they impacted our team. This is a child who once felt completely invisible. Hearing him say that meant he is starting to feel valued and safe.

One moment that moved our team deeply was when Gun opened his small locker and carefully pulled out a Bible storybook he had kept inside. Holding it gently, he looked down and quietly said, "This book is important to me now. I read it every night before bed." A child once surrounded by darkness and chaos is now beginning to learn about his best friend Jesus.

Gun's story is still being written. So is the story of every child like him waiting to be found. Every person who chooses to advocate for children like Gun, whether through prayer, giving, or simply refusing to look away, becomes part of that story. You may never meet Gun. But your choice to champion the most vulnerable means he doesn't have to walk alone. ■

THE LEGEND OF THE PINK DOLPHIN

A dark mask for reality in the Amazon

If you find yourself visiting the beautiful Amazon region of Brazil, you'll have the opportunity to see a variety of exotic wildlife, such as macaws, toucans, and—if you're lucky—a jaguar or a caiman from a distance. But if you spend time on the river, you will undoubtedly see my favorite wildlife: dolphins. The Amazon River is home to several species, but the most famous is the Pink River Dolphin.

You may have heard of them, but did you know they've been used for generations to mask sexual abuse? Folklore says that on festive nights, the pink dolphin leaves the river and transforms into a handsome young man dressed in white, wearing a hat to hide the blowhole on the top of his head. He appears to seduce young women, winning their hearts before disappearing back into the water before sunrise.

You might think nobody would believe this in our modern age. However, when visiting indigenous tribes in the Amazon, I've heard firsthand that they still hold this folklore to be true. But how does it relate to hiding abuse? The "Pink Dolphin" became a convenient way to explain away pregnancies or sexual encounters involving teenage girls who couldn't disclose their partners. For many, it was far easier to say, "The dolphin did it," than to point to the girl's father or an influential adult in the community. This is a story that protects the predator while silencing the child.

During one of Child Impact Brazil's most recent community visits, we heard a pink dolphin story. Liz* is a 14-year-old girl who moved in with an older woman to escape her mother's house after being abused by two different men—her mother's boyfriends. The school noticed what was happening and tried to address the situation with Liz's mother, who told the school manager that "the pink dolphin" had done it. In spite of the principal's disbelief and persistence, Liz's mom maintained that story. One would hope that this lady would take better care of Liz; however, per the school's report, this woman is now abusing Liz herself. This is the tragic cycle we see too often—children fleeing one predator only to land in the hands of another because they have nowhere truly safe to go.

While Liz's story is truly heartbreaking, the data shows she is far from alone. In Brazil, every 8 minutes, one child suffers sexual abuse (SA). As a matter of fact, the 2025 Brazilian Public Security Yearbook shows the worst historical scenario in Brazil. Approximately 77% of victims of SA were under 14 years of age. Among these children and adolescents, approximately 45-64% of abusers are direct family members—the very people who are supposed to be their primary protectors.

The same 2025 report recorded a 14% increase in crimes related to the production of child sexual abuse material. A different national survey showed that 50% of human trafficking reports involved children and 77% of trafficked women and girls are exploited for sex. Reported child sexual abuse and exploitation reached a sad total of 18,800 victims in 2024. While these numbers are alarming as they are, it is estimated that only 10% of cases are actually reported.

In my experience as Director of Child Impact Brazil, I've seen this to be true. Once people find out that I work in sexual abuse prevention, they start telling me stories of abuse that they themselves or people around them went through. When I ask them if the abuse was reported, the vast majority tell me that it never was. Everyone has a different reason for it. In the Amazon, the

most common reason I hear is the most heartbreaking: "There is no point reporting. I'll still have to come home to my abuser, and then it'll be worse."

You can't tell a child to speak up if you aren't prepared to protect them from the consequences once they do.

This is the reality we are fighting. Reporting a crime is an act of immense bravery, but that bravery is crushed when the child knows that after the police report is filed, they will walk right back through the same front door where their abuser waits.

We refuse to accept that Liz's story, and so many like hers, must stay this way. We refuse to embrace a reality where young girls have no place to go. Our new Child Impact Amazon team is proud to be part of the movement helping bring awareness to this issue through our outreach programs in isolated communities. But awareness is only the first step. To provide a true exit ramp from this cycle, we are planning to open our first rescue campus in Brazil!

This 207-acre boarding school in Barreirinha will be a sanctuary of restoration. It is strategically located—secluded enough to provide safety, yet close enough to the community to be a light of hope for children who have had none. For girls like Liz, this campus means more than just a roof; it represents the end of horrific "dolphin legends" and the beginning of a life rooted in truth and hope. Imagine a place where, instead of fear, these girls wake up to the sounds of the forest and the opportunity to heal.

Here, victims will receive specialized trauma care and a high-quality education. They will learn to plant, to grow, and to see themselves as something beautiful and strong, just like the trees they tend to. We are building a place where childhood is reclaimed, play is restored, and hope for a brighter future is awakened.

But we cannot build this refuge alone. Every brick, every bed, and every classroom is a statement to these children that they are worth fighting for. Your support turns this dream into a haven of safety. Join us in rewriting these stories and planting hope—because every child deserves a future where they are finally truly safe and can find peace. ■

How investing in one child can transform communities for years to come

What does it mean to truly impact someone's life?

At Child Impact International, that question is at the heart of everything we do. It begins with a single act of generosity, but it never stops there.

When you give, something bigger begins.

Dr. Bhaggien believed that every child deserves the chance to learn, to communicate, and to thrive. His decades of commitment to the school helped lay the foundation for the life-changing work that continues today.

Now, every evening as boys gather within these walls to worship, socialize, and study, his legacy quietly lives on.

The dormitory represents more than bricks and mortar; it represents possibility.

A boy who once had no access to education now has a place to study. A child who lived in a silent world struggling to communicate now has a community where he is understood. A student who was overlooked now

has the chance to imagine a different future.

This is what impact looks like.

Just as a small stone dropped in a calm pool of water creates an ever-growing ripple, impact grows, multiplies, and reaches far beyond a single moment.

When we invest in children, the impact doesn't end with one life; it continues into classrooms, families, and communities, creating change for generations to come. ■

BREAKING THE CYCLE

A child's journey from poverty to possibility

Poverty has a way of repeating itself.

It is passed down from one generation to the next, shaping what a family believes is possible. For many children, it is simply the life they are born into and the only one they can imagine. But education has the power to change that, giving a child the tools to imagine something different and the strength to pursue it.

Kevin is one of those children, and his road to get there was anything but easy.

Kevin is the third of seven children. His mother worked in other people's fields, and his father worked as a herdsman. Together, they earned just enough to feed their family one meal a day.

When Kevin was five years old, he came home from school to an empty house. That evening, his father returned and asked, "Where is your mother?" Kevin told him he hadn't found her. After searching, they discovered she had left, taking Kevin's younger brother, Jacob, with her. Unable to bear the difficult living conditions and with no clear way out, she moved in with her brother, where she began to be exploited by men. She eventually married another man and started a new life.

Kevin and his siblings stayed with their father and continued on as best they could. His father kept working, herding other people's cattle to provide for the family. Kevin worked hard in school and was preparing for his grade seven exams when tragedy struck. His father was given a job moving a wealthy man's cattle to an auction. He had no idea the cattle had been stolen or that the man who hired him was one of the thieves. When people saw the stolen cattle, they assumed his father was the thief and attacked him. He was killed, an innocent man just trying to earn money for his family.

Kevin knew immediately that his dreams of getting an education were gone. His hopes had vanished, and he didn't know what to do. His mother had left. His father was dead. He had no relatives to turn to. Eventually, Kevin and his younger siblings decided to go and look for their mother. When they found her, she was living with another man. They had nowhere else to go, so they stayed. Their stepfather began exploiting them, forcing them to work long hours in other people's fields or carry heavy loads at the market just to earn a little money to take care of themselves and their younger siblings. Through all of it, Kevin never stopped wanting to learn.

Then one day, a church member called Kevin's mother. They had heard about Kevin's situation and wanted to know if he would like to continue his studies. They told her about Twing Memorial School, a school sponsored by Child Impact International that walks alongside students living in difficult circumstances and helps make education possible.

Kevin's prayers had been answered! He had a chance to go back to school, and today he continues to thank God for that. The cycle of poverty that had defined his family for generations does not have to define his future. For Kevin, that cycle ends here. ■

THE LIGHT COMES ON FOR AMIRA

After years of darkness, a chance to dream for a forgotten child

Most of the important decisions in our lives are ones we get to make ourselves. But the decisions that shape a child's life the most are the ones they never get to make.

No child chooses where they are born. They don't choose their parents. They don't choose their country. They don't choose whether they are born into safety...or into danger.

Yet, these unchosen circumstances determine so much. When we think about what creates a secure childhood, four factors often rise to the surface: loving parent(s), proper nutrition, safety from abuse, and freedom.

For most of us, these feel foundational—almost assumed. But the reality is sobering: only 1 in 10 children worldwide experience all four at the same time.

That reality invites reflection. It reminds us just how much of our own story was shaped by blessings we did nothing to earn and how

many children are still waiting for even one of those foundations to be in place.

At Child Impact, one of our core values is simple but powerful: dream. We believe every child deserves the opportunity to write their own story. Amira* is one of those children.

In a single devastating chapter of her life, Amira lost all four secure childhood factors. Her father abandoned the family. Soon after, her mother was killed by a suicide car bomber. Left in the care of her grandfather, survival became desperate and tragic. In order to provide for the family, he began trafficking Amira to men.

When our team first encountered her, she was in a subway station selling tarot cards. What we didn't know at the time was just how much pain she was carrying. Later, we learned that Amira had attempted to take her own life three times by ingesting rat poison. And yet, even in the darkness, she held onto a fragile hope. Amira once shared that her dream was simple: that one day, the light would be switched on for her.

Today, that light has begun to shine.

Amira is now living in a Child Impact safe house in an undisclosed country. For the first time in years, she is experiencing a loving environment—one free from abuse, exploitation, and fear. She is safe. She is cared for. She is learning. And slowly, she is beginning to dream again.

This is the difference you are making.

Because of your generosity, girls like Amira are given something they never had before: a real chance. A chance to heal. A chance to be protected. A chance to rediscover hope and step into a future they choose for themselves.

There are still so many children waiting for that same light.

Together, we can reach them. ■

SEEING HOPE FACE-TO-FACE

Witnessing the transformative power of child sponsorship

For Steve Duffy, sponsoring children in Thailand through Child Impact International has become far more than a monthly commitment—it's a deeply personal connection that has reshaped how he sees the world.

"It's easy to think of sponsorship as just giving," Steve said, "but it's really about giving a child a future."

Through his support, children receive education, meals, and stability—things many of us take for granted. But it wasn't until Steve visited the Sunshine Orchard school in Thailand during a donor trip with Child Impact that the impact came into focus.

Child Impact sponsors students at Sunshine Orchard who have fled Myanmar as refugees—many escaping war and unimaginable hardship. Meeting them face-to-face left a lasting mark.

"Being there changes you," Steve said. "You see what they've been through, and

yet there's still so much hope in them. That stays with you."

Walking through the school, Steve saw more than academics—he saw transformation, both spiritually and educationally, grounded in the love and teachings of Jesus. Children who once lived

in uncertainty now have safety, structure, hope, and the chance to simply be kids.

"You realize this isn't abstract," he explained. "This is real. These are real lives being changed."

For Steve, sponsorship is about more than meeting physical needs—it's about reminding a child that they matter.

"I want them to know that someone believes in them," he said. "and that they're not forgotten."

That connection has become one of the most meaningful parts of the journey. Following the children's progress, celebrating their milestones—it's personal.

"You start rooting for them," Steve said. "Their wins feel like your wins."

Just as importantly, the experience has changed him.

"[Sponsorship] shifts your perspective," he reflected. "You stop focusing on things that don't matter and start thinking about how you can make a difference."

And for Steve, that's what it comes down to. "You may not be able to change the whole world," he said. "But you can change someone's world. And that's everything."

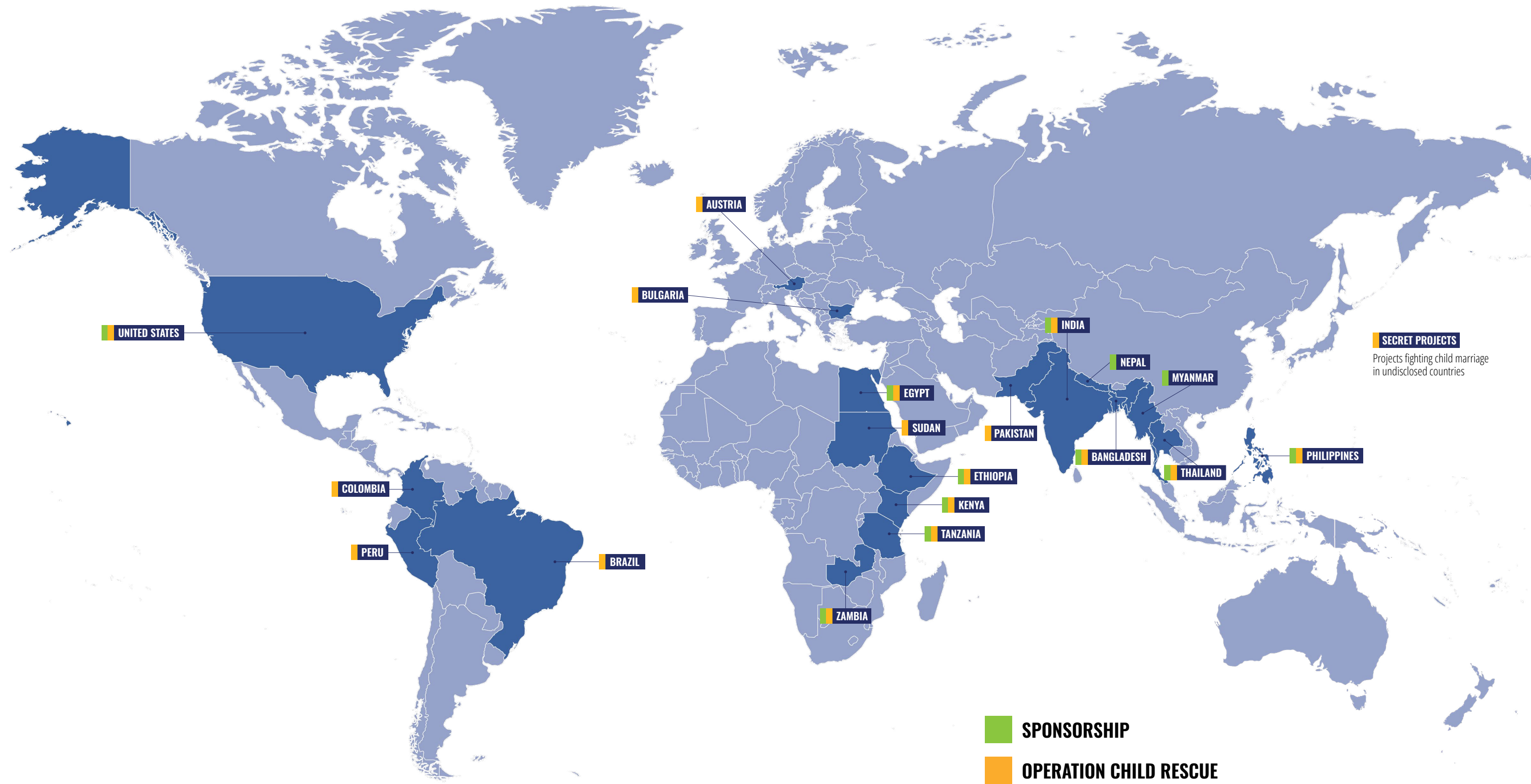
